# Projects Objectives

---

- Students should appreciate the complexities involved in modeling and evaluating a network
  - Building of traffic models

# Description of Projects

---

1. Analysis and simulation of basic service disciplines for a polling system
  - Assume a network comprised of one central server and  $N$  (variable) terminals. The server uses a basic service discipline such as exhaustive, gated, and the  $L$ -limited schemes to service the  $N$  terminals.
  - Arrival process – Bernoulli and more detailed models (correlated arrivals for example)
  - Write a simple simulation code to evaluate each of these service schemes in terms of buffer occupancy, delay, and utilization
  - Compare with analytic results in the literature
  - A GUI component is a bonus

# Description of Projects

---

2. Simulation and evaluation of an Integrated Services IEEE802.11 network
  - Assume an IEEE802.11 wireless LAN setting with one access point and  $N$  (variable) terminals on the ground. The terminals belong to two classes – real-time and non-real-time terminal. It is required to model the collision-based and collision-free multiple access schemes supported by the LAN to support the non real-time and the real-time traffic streams, respectively.
  - Write a simple simulation code to model these two access schemes.
  - For a given arrival process of traffic (may start with simple Bernoulli models) evaluate the performance of the LAN in terms of terminal throughput, network throughput, and traffic delay (for each type)
  - A GUI component is a bonus

# Description of Projects

---

3. Simulation and evaluation of IEEE802.11 network support for real-time services
  - Assume an IEEE802.11 wireless LAN setting with one access point and N (variable) terminals on the ground. The terminals generate real-time traffic such as voice and utilize the polling mechanism to transport this traffic.
  - Write a code to simulate such network. Produce results such as terminal throughput, network throughput, average delay for payloads, drop rate, etc.
  - A GUI component is a bonus

# Description of Projects

---

4. TCP/IP window and slow-start study over wireless channels
  - Assume two nodes are communicating using TCP/IP. The TCP initializes a transmission window and starts sending sequenced segments. The window size increases as the session progresses increasing the utilization of the link. When congestion is occurring (lost segments or their acknowledgments) the TCP reduces the window size to reduce outgoing traffic. This leads to lower utilization of the link. After some time of no data loss, TCP increases the window size again to increase the link utilization and so on.
  - For wireless links, packets may be lost due to errors and not necessarily due to congestion and buffer overflow.
  - Write a simulation code that emulates this process. Determine the actual parameters used in current TCP/IP based transport. For a given arrival process of segments at the source nodes, and a given error model on the wireless link, find the average throughput of the wireless link and the average segment delay

---

5. Capacity Evaluation For UMTS Integrated-Service Network - Design and simulation - 2
  - The study should includes but not limited to:
    - An overall view of the procedures and functionalities within UMTS network for transmission voice and of packet data
    - A description of these channels
    - For a given specific simple scenario (one BTS and multiple mobile terminal) write a code to simulate and evaluate the performance of such a network
    - The references used for this study
  - Deliverable:
    - Report – including the source/binary code
    - Presentation
  - Where to start:

---

6. Queuing system calculator/simulator
  - The project involves writing a code to simulate a c server ( $c \geq 1$ ) queueing system and producing queue statistics for a given degree of confidence
  - The calculator should accept a wide range of arrival and service processes (at least the classical ones)
  - Comparison with analytic results should be performed where applicable
  - A GUI is also required to facilitate user interface

# Description of Projects

---

7. Analysis and simulation of an m-terminal polling system where gated-limited service discipline is utilized
- Assume a network of  $m$  terminals and one central server. The service implements a gated-limited service discipline.
  - It is required to write a code to simulate the service for some arrival/service-time processes.
  - The code should also include the ability to prioritize buffers (changing service order).
  - A GUI component is a plus

# Example of a Simple Queueing Code (2)

---

- Event Driven Simulation
  - System clock moved as events occur
- Arrival process – vector A
  - Instants in time when arrivals occur
- C – channels vector
  - Instants in time when service completes
