

**ARC 443 Special Tonics on Islamic Architecture:
The Architecture of the Central District of the
Islamic City**

The central district of any Islamic city represents the location of the best of its architectural features. This course will survey, in detail the important architectural monuments such as mosques, bazzars, khans and madrasahs. there will be emphasis on . the form, function and architectural characteristics of those buildings. The structural architectural and urban changes in this part of the city will discussed.

Objective:

This course is intended to be an upper level course oriented for students who want to be exposed to an in depth investigation of the architectural form and structure of the heart of the Islamic city.

Project or Term papers:

Project could be any initiative related to the course contents. A good example of

this is a documentation of the historically significant buildings or a district located in nearby traditional cities. In this case, the students are expected to have ,a general knowledge about the documentation process including pre-site preparation in work and post site-visit stage requirements and tasks.

Term papers could be a research in any subject related to the course contents. A good example of this work is the selection of one of the building types of the Central District of the Islamic City and studying it in details using proper research methodology .The length of the term paper is about ten pages excluding the cover page, the bibliography, and drawings and/or pictures, if any.

Project or term papers should be submitted promptly and any late projects or papers will have negative impact on the grading of the work done.
