Description: Definite and indefinite integrals of functions of a single variable.

Fundamental Theorem of Calculus. Techniques of integration. Application of the definite integral to area, volume, arc length and surface of revolution. Improper integrals. Sequences and series: convergence tests, integral, comparison, ratio and root tests. Alternating series. Absolute and conditional convergence. Power

series. Taylor and Maclarin series.

Grading Policy

- 1. Exam I: 25% (100 points), Date: Wednesday, March 31, 2010. A common multiple choice exam. Material: 5.1-6.3.
- 2. Exam II: 25% (100 points), Date: Sunday, May 02, 2010. A common written exam. Material: 6.5-11.1.
- 3. Class Work: 15% (60 points). It is based on quizzes (around 5 quizzes), homework, or other class activities determined by the instructor. Any quiz or test under class activity should be of written type and not of a multiple choice type.
