1. (8-points) Find the average value of $f(x) = \frac{\sin(\pi/x)}{x^2}$ on the interval $[1, 3]$.

$$f_{\text{ave}} = \frac{1}{3-1} \int_1^3 \frac{\sin(\pi/x)}{x^2} dx$$

1pt

Do substitution $u = \frac{\pi}{x}$, $du = -\frac{\pi}{x^2} dx$, $x=1 \Rightarrow u=\pi$, $x=3 \Rightarrow u=\frac{\pi}{3}$

$$f_{\text{ave}} = \frac{1}{2\pi} \int_{\pi/3}^{\pi} \sin(u) du$$

1pt

$$= \frac{-1}{2\pi} \cos(u) \Big|_{\pi/3}^{\pi} = \frac{-1}{2\pi} \left(-1 - \frac{1}{2}\right) = \frac{3\pi}{4}$$

1pt

2. (8-points) Write out, without evaluating the coefficients, the form of the partial fraction decomposition of the function

$$\frac{x^7 + x + 1}{(x+1)^2(x^2+1)(x^4-1)}.$$

$$(x+1)^2(x^2+1)(x^4-1) = (x-1) (x+1)^3 (x^2+1)^2$$

2pt

$$\frac{x^7+x+1}{(x+1)^2(x^2+1)(x^4-1)} = \frac{A_1}{x-1} + \frac{A_2}{x+1} + \frac{A_3}{(x+1)^2} + \frac{A_4}{(x+1)^3} + \frac{A_5x+A_6}{x^2+1} + \frac{A_7x+A_8}{(x^2+1)^2}$$

1 pt for each fraction = 6pt

3. (6-points) Evaluate the integral $\int x \sec^2 x dx$.

2 pt

Using integration by parts with $u=x$ $v=\tan x$
 $du=dx$ $dv=\sec^2 x dx$

$$\int x \sec^2 x dx = \underbrace{x \tan x - \int \tan x dx}_{\underline{2 \text{ pt}}} = \underbrace{x \tan x - \ln |\sec x| + C}_{\underline{2 \text{ pt}}},$$

4. (8-points) Evaluate the integral $\int_0^{\pi/2} \sin^2 x \cos 3x dx$.

Using the trigonometric identity $\sin^2 x = \frac{1-\cos 2x}{2}$ 1 pt

$$\int_0^{\pi/2} \sin^2 x \cos 3x dx = \int_0^{\pi/2} \frac{\cos 3x}{2} - \frac{\cos 3x \cos 2x}{2} dx \quad \underline{1 \text{ pt}}$$

Using the trigonometric identity $\cos 3x \sin 2x = \frac{1}{2} [\cos 5x + \cos x]$ 1 pt

$$\int_0^{\pi/2} \sin^2 x \cos 3x dx = \int_0^{\pi/2} \frac{\cos 3x}{2} - \frac{\cos 5x}{4} - \frac{\cos x}{4} dx \quad \underline{1 \text{ pt}}$$

$$= \frac{\sin 3x}{6} \Big|_0^{\pi/2} - \frac{\sin 5x}{20} \Big|_0^{\pi/2} - \frac{\sin x}{4} \Big|_0^{\pi/2} \quad \underline{3 \text{ pt}}$$

$$= \frac{-1}{6} - \frac{1}{20} - \frac{1}{4} = \frac{-7}{15} \quad \underline{1 \text{ pt}}$$

5. (14-points) Evaluate the integral $\int \frac{t}{\sqrt{t^2 - 6t + 13}} dt.$

Let $I = \int \frac{t}{\sqrt{t^2 - 6t + 13}} dt.$

$$I = \int \frac{t}{\sqrt{(t-3)^2 + 4}} dt \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$$


After substitution $\underline{\underline{u = t-3}}, \underline{\underline{1pt}} I = \int \frac{u+3}{\sqrt{u^2 + 4}} du \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$

Do the trigonometric substitution $u = 2\tan\theta, -\pi/2 < \theta < \pi/2$
 $du = 2\sec^2\theta d\theta \quad \underline{\underline{2pt}}$

$$I = \int \frac{2\tan\theta + 3}{\sqrt{4\tan^2\theta + 4}} 2\sec^2\theta d\theta = \int \frac{2\tan\theta + 3}{2\sec\theta} 2\sec^2\theta d\theta \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$$

$$= \int (2\tan\theta + 3)\sec\theta d\theta = 2 \int \tan\theta \sec\theta d\theta + 3 \int \sec\theta d\theta \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$$

$$= 2\sec\theta + 3\ln|\sec\theta + \tan\theta| + C \quad \underline{\underline{2pt}} + \underline{\underline{2pt}}$$

Substitute back the initial variable using 
 $\sec\theta = \frac{1}{2}\sqrt{u^2 + 4} \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$

$$I = 2 \cdot \frac{1}{2}\sqrt{u^2 + 4} + 3\ln\left|\frac{1}{2}\sqrt{u^2 + 4} + \frac{u}{2}\right| + C \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}} \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$$

$$I = \sqrt{t^2 - 6t + 13} + 3\ln\left|\frac{1}{2}\sqrt{t^2 - 6t + 13} + \frac{t}{2} - \frac{3}{2}\right| + C \quad \underline{\underline{1pt}}$$

or

$$= \sqrt{t^2 - 6t + 13} + 3\ln\left|\sqrt{t^2 - 6t + 13} + t - 3\right| + C.$$

6. (14-points) Use substitution $t = \tan(x/2)$, $-\pi < x < \pi$, to evaluate the integral

$$\int \frac{1}{\sin x + \cos x} dx.$$

$$t = \tan\left(\frac{x}{2}\right) \Rightarrow \cos x = \frac{1-t^2}{1+t^2}, \sin x = \frac{2t}{1+t^2}, dx = \frac{2}{1+t^2} dt$$

$$I = \int \frac{1}{\sin x + \cos x} dx = \int \frac{2}{1+2t-t^2} dt = 2 \int \frac{dt}{2-(t-1)^2}$$

$$\text{After substitution, } u = t-1, I = 2 \int \frac{du}{2-u^2}$$

Decompose $\frac{1}{2-u^2}$ into partial fractions:

$$\frac{1}{2-u^2} = \frac{1}{(\sqrt{2}-u)(\sqrt{2}+u)} = \frac{A}{\sqrt{2}-u} + \frac{B}{\sqrt{2}+u} \Rightarrow A=B=\frac{1}{2\sqrt{2}}$$

$$I = 2 \cdot \frac{1}{2\sqrt{2}} \left[\int \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}-u} du + \int \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}+u} du \right]$$

$$= \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \left[-\ln|\sqrt{2}-u| + \ln|\sqrt{2}+u| \right] + C$$

$$= \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \ln \left| \frac{\sqrt{2}+u}{\sqrt{2}-u} \right| + C = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \ln \left| \frac{\sqrt{2}-1+t}{\sqrt{2}+1-t} \right| + C$$

$$= \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \ln \left| \frac{\sqrt{2}-1+\tan(\frac{x}{2})}{\sqrt{2}+1-\tan(\frac{x}{2})} \right| + C$$

7. (12-points) Evaluate, if possible, the improper integral $\int_0^2 \frac{dx}{\sqrt[3]{|x-1|}}$.

Check the improper integrals $\int_0^1 (x-1)^{-1/3} dx$ and $\int_1^2 (x-1)^{-1/3} dx$.

$$\bullet \lim_{t \rightarrow 1^-} \int_0^t (x-1)^{-1/3} dx = \lim_{t \rightarrow 1^-} \left[\frac{3}{2} (x-1)^{2/3} \right]_0^t = \lim_{t \rightarrow 1^-} \left(\frac{3}{2} (t-1)^{2/3} - \frac{3}{2} \right) = -\frac{3}{2}$$

1pt 1pt

$$\text{Then } \int_0^1 (x-1)^{-1/3} dx = -\frac{3}{2}$$

1pt

$$\bullet \lim_{t \rightarrow 1^+} \int_t^2 (x-1)^{-1/3} dx = \lim_{t \rightarrow 1^+} \left[\frac{3}{2} (x-1)^{2/3} \right]_t^2 = \lim_{t \rightarrow 1^+} \left(\frac{3}{2} - \frac{3}{2} (t-1)^{2/3} \right) = \frac{3}{2}$$

1pt 1pt

$$\text{Then } \int_1^2 (x-1)^{-1/3} dx = \frac{3}{2}$$

1pt

Since both improper integrals converge, we can write

$$\int_0^2 \frac{dx}{\sqrt[3]{|x-1|}} = - \int_0^1 \frac{dx}{(x-1)^{1/3}} + \int_1^2 \frac{dx}{(x-1)^{1/3}}$$

1pt

$$= -\left(-\frac{3}{2}\right) + \left(\frac{3}{2}\right)$$

$$= 3$$

8. (10-points) Find the value of a so that the length of the arc on the curve $y = \cosh x$

from the point $P(0, 1)$ to the point $Q(\ln a, \frac{a + a^{-1}}{2})$ is 2.

$$\begin{aligned} L &= \int_0^{\ln a} \sqrt{1 + \left(\frac{dy}{dx}\right)^2} dx = 2 \\ &\quad \underline{1pt} \quad \underline{1pt} \\ \Rightarrow \int_0^{\ln a} \cosh x dx &= 2 \quad \underline{1pt} \\ \Rightarrow \sinh x \Big|_0^{\ln a} &= 2 \quad \underline{1pt} \\ \Rightarrow \sinh(\ln a) - \sinh(0) &= 2 \Rightarrow \sinh(\ln a) = 2 \quad \underline{1pt} \\ \Rightarrow \frac{a - a^{-1}}{2} &= 4 \Rightarrow a^2 - 8a - 1 = 0 \Rightarrow a = 4 + \sqrt{17} \quad \underline{1pt} \\ &\quad \underline{1pt} \end{aligned}$$

9. (10-points) Find the area of the surface obtained by revolving the curve


$$y = 4\sqrt{x+1}, \quad 0 \leq x \leq 4 \text{ about the } x\text{-axis.}$$

$$\begin{aligned} S &= \int_0^4 2\pi y \sqrt{1 + \left(\frac{dy}{dx}\right)^2} dx \\ &\quad \underline{1pt} \quad \underline{1pt} \quad \underline{1pt} \\ &= \int_0^4 2\pi \cdot 4 \cdot \sqrt{x+1} \sqrt{\frac{x+5}{x+1}} dx \quad \underline{1pt} \\ &= 8\pi \int_0^4 \sqrt{x+5} dx = 8\pi \cdot \frac{2}{3} (x+5)^{3/2} \Big|_0^4 \quad \underline{2pt} \\ &= \frac{16}{3}\pi (27 - 5^{3/2}) \quad \underline{1pt} \end{aligned}$$

10. (10-points) Use the method of cylindrical shells to find the volume generated by rotating the region bounded by the line $y = x$ and the curve $y = 4x - x^2$ about the line $x = 4$.

$$4x - x^2 = x \Rightarrow x^2 - 3x = 0 \Rightarrow x=0 \text{ or } x=3 \quad | \underline{1pt}$$

$$r = 4-x \quad | \underline{1pt} \quad h = (4x - x^2) - x \quad | \underline{1pt}$$



$$\begin{aligned} \text{Volume} &= \int_0^3 2\pi (4-x) (3x - x^2) dx \\ &\quad | \underline{1pt} \quad | \underline{1pt} \quad | \underline{1pt} \\ &= 2\pi \int_0^3 (12x - 7x^2 + x^3) dx \quad | \underline{1pt} \end{aligned}$$

$$= 2\pi \left(6x^2 - \frac{7}{3}x^3 + \frac{1}{4}x^4 \right) \Big|_0^3 \quad | \underline{2pt}$$

$$= 2\pi \left(54 - 63 + \frac{81}{4} \right)$$

$$= \frac{45\pi}{2} \quad | \underline{1pt}$$
