Course Syllabus

Course Description:

The course introduces students to the history and theories of urban spatial design. The course will review the various factors influencing the design of urban spaces, the different design elements and the urban design process. Approaches applied in the development of urban spaces throughout history will be discussed including Greek, Roman, Renaissance, Islamic, and modem & post-modem periods. Influential urban design theories and concepts along with their application and feasibility will be studied. Emphasis throughout the course will be on urban social behavior and psychological effect of the urban space.

Course Objectives:

- 1- Introduce the students to the discipline of urban design, including highlighting its relationship to architecture and planning.
- 2- Introduce the students to the different elements used in the design of urban spaces, to the factors that shape the form of the urban spaces and to the process of designing these spaces.
- 3- Introduce the students to urban design treatments in different historical periods, including highlighting the theories and thoughts that shape the treatments.

4- Highlight contemporary problems of urban design, including pointing out strategies to address them.

Course Format:

The course will be delivered in the form of lectures and discussions. Students will be assigned readings and assignments from time to time and they are expected to participate in class discussions on these readings and assignments.
