

Problem # 1 (50 points):


Consider the following network.

1. Assume that host \mathbf{B} sends an IP datagram to host \mathbf{C} .

Source IP address	Destination IP address	Receiving interface IP address that was passed down to the Data Link layer to be used for forwarding


2. Assume that host A sends an IP datagram to host F.

Note that the current tables' values \underline{prior} to the link cost change are as shown in the leftmost column of the tables.
